Eligibility

Infants, birth to 34 months of age, may be eligible if they meet one of the following criteria:

Developmental Delay -

Have a significant difference between the expected level of development for their age and their current level of functioning in one of the following areas: cognitive, communication, physical/motor, social/emotional, and adaptive skills.

- For children ages 0 to 34 months of age, a significant delay is a 33% delay in one or more developmental areas.

Established Risk -

Have a diagnosed physical or mental condition that has a high probability of resulting in a developmental delay. Examples include genetic disorders; central nervous system infections; certain neurological diseases or trauma; and disorders secondary to exposure to toxic substances.

Developmental Disability -

Have a diagnosis or condition that meets the criteria for eligibility for Regional Center services after the age of three years under the Lanterman Act. These include: Intellectual Disability, epilepsy, autism, cerebral palsy, and conditions requiring treatment similar to Intellectual Disability. The diagnosis or condition must also constitute a substantial lifelong handicap for the child.

High Risk -

Having a condition that can put the child at high risk for having a substantial developmental disability. Examples include: Prematurity <32 weeks, and/or birth weight <1500 gms.; small gestational growth; below 3% for Intrauterine Growth Retardation; Severe Respiratory Distress; Asphyxia neonatorum; Severe and persistent metabolic abnormality; neonatal seizures or febrile seizures; central nervous system lesion, abnormality, or infection; serious biomedical insult; multiple congenital anomalies or genetic disorders with affect development; prenatal substance exposure; persistent hypotonia or hypertonia; clinical significant failure to thrive; parent with dev. Disability; prenatal exposure to teratogens; and informed clinical opinion.

Services

Diagnosis and Evaluation Developmental, hearing, medical, speech, and vision evaluation may be provided to establish whether a child has a developmental delay or an established risk for a developmental disability. These evaluations are completed by Regional Center staff or coordinated within the community.

Service Coordination A Service Coordinator is assigned to each family to provide support and referral in order to assure that appropriate services are obtained. When a child is found eligible for Early Intervention services, an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) is developed and reviewed every six months.

Developmental Services These may include infant development programs, parent education, family training, speech therapy, hearing and vision services, physical and occupational therapy, psychological services, and assistive technology services.

Health Services Nursing, nutrition, and medical consultation may be provided if they are necessary to enable infants and toddlers to benefit from the other early intervention services.

Other Services Other services include social work services, counseling, and transportation assistance if necessary to enable a child to benefit from other early intervention services.

Funding For Services Regional Center will provide funding for Early Intervention services that are required to meet the child's outcomes on the Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) when all other public sources of funding have been exhausted and the family's private insurance has been accessed for those services determined to be medical in nature.
