 - SSI/SSA, IHSS, Medi-Cal, CCS, etc.









Comparison of Ethnicity FY 2000 ~ FY 2017




SG/PRC General Facts - Ethnicity & Language FY 2017




Comparison of Ages by Ethnicity FY 2017




SG/PRC General Facts - Residence FY 14 to FY 17

What has SG/PRC been doing?

- Positive changes in POS authorizations and expenditures for FY 16-17 may result from the following:
 - Increased awareness and attention to possible disparities
 - Staff training on building cultural understanding "Culture of one"
 - Follow-up regarding NO POS for individuals associated with SG/PRC
 - Follow-up regarding persons/families utilizing less than 80% of the authorized service

Hired more Service Coordinators...

- SG/PRC hired more SC to reduce caseload
- SG/PRC continues to hire bilingual SCs to meet the needs of eligible individuals and families






% NO POS – Ethnicity by Age Groups – FY17




% NO POS by Ages and Languages FY 17



% NO POS for Age 22+ by Languages FY15 ~ FY17









What are the Trends?

- For those living at home with family, there was an increase in POS expenditures in FY 2017 over FY 2016 when looking at all ages
- Major gains were made in expenditures for Hispanic babies and toddlers (0-2 years of age).

What are the Trends?

- Differences between different ethnic groups continue, with expenditures for Hispanic school-aged children and Hispanic adults being less than the average.
- Concerning disparity seems to be increasing for African American babies and toddlers for authorizations, utilization and expenditures.



What are the Trends in Utilization?

- Across all languages and ethnicities, the average utilization of authorized POS funds is 84.0% (FY 16 was 83.7%).
- Utilization continues to be the lowest in the 0-2 year age group at 68.4%, increases to 76.5% for 3 to 21 year olds, and then 88.3% for those 22 years old and older.

What are the Trends in Utilization by Language?

- The lowest POS utilization (comparing expenditure to authorization) by language (with 20 or more clients) overall* was for Cantonese (76.1%), Mandarin (79.0%), Arabic (79.1%) and Vietnamese (81.2%).
- In comparison, clients and their families who are primary Spanish speakers utilize services at 81.3% and English at 84.9%.

Surprising Trends by Language

Across all ages, English was the language* with the highest percentage of NO POS services at 21.9% (total of 10,901 persons)

Vietnamese was 20.0% (125 persons served) Mandarin was 19.1% (272 persons served) Korean was 14.1% (71 persons served)


In Early Start, those who spoke English had the highest percentage of NO POS at 1.3%. The next highest percentage in Early Start of NO POS was Spanish at 0.9%.

*Note *(with 20 or more persons served)

Surprising Trends by Ethnicity

- The highest percentage of NO POS (21.9%) is for African American persons served. (Hispanic is 21.2%.)
- For babies and toddlers, African Americans have the lowest authorizations, expenditures and the lowest utilization.
- Plus, this discrepancy in POS for Early Start services seems to be getting bigger over the past three years.

Major Trends

- Disparity is real -- with expenditures for Latino/Hispanic persons served being less than the average across All Ages, compared to other ethnicities.
- Comparing based on similar age "profiles" --

Authorization: Asian \$8,728 Hispanic \$7,515

• Expenditure: Asian \$6,626 Hispanic \$5,566

Major Trends -- POS ONLY

- People within the Latino/Hispanic group still have less per person authorizations and expenditures across all age groups than people in the Asian group, the most comparable group to Hispanic.
- POS recipients only:
 - Hispanic (6,498) Authorization \$14,220 (\$912 less than Asian)
 - Hispanic (6,498) Expenditure \$11,515 (\$815 less than Asian)
 - Asian (1,349) Authorization \$15,132
 - Asian (1,349) Expenditure \$12,330

Two Major Challenges Remain

- Outreach to the Asian Community to achieve more representation across all Asian groups within SG/PRC – so that the percentage of SG/PRC persons served is more similar to the percentage in the general population.
- Help African American and Hispanic families feel more comfortable and confident in accessing and utilizing regional center paid services.

Major conclusions

Culture more powerful than Language –

- While speaking a primary language other than English can certainly be a barrier to accessing services, the SG/PRC data supports that ethnicity – which is as close as we can measure "culture" with these data – appears to be a more powerful influence than language in accessing and utilizing regional center paid services.
- Building relationships with families is important in building trust that leads to willingness of the family to access services.

What is SG/PRC doing to build relationships?

- Second look at the Projects started as a result of Community input --
 - Building the parents' confidence to be effective partners with the regional center to access services and supports for their family members and to help other parents do the same:
 - Parent Mentor Initiative (PMI)
 - Navigating the Regional Center System (NRCS) Workshops
 - Train parents to train other parents in the "Understanding my Child's Disability" information -- online and in person
